## Journey Stories: A Request for Proposals

The Mississippi Humanities Council invites applications for a Smithsonian Traveling Exhibit, *Journey Stories*. Developed for rural audiences and small museums, libraries, community centers and other nonprofit organizations with limited access to traveling exhibits, *Journey Stories* addresses migration and immigration as they relate to the American experience. *Journey Stories* is the account of

immigrants coming in search of promise in a new country; the story of individuals and families relocating in search of fortune, their own homestead, or employment; the harrowing journeys of Africans and Native Americans forced to move; and of course, fun and frolic on the open road. These topics are told by way of engaging images, audio and artifacts that illustrate the critical roles travel and movement have played in building our diverse American society. ## Landmarks of American History and Culture Workshops for Teachers

**(JACKSON, MS)** – The Hamer Institute at Jackson State University will host a Summer Landmarks of American Democracy Workshop during June 2008. This one-week workshop, funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities, will be offered for community college faculty June 15–21, 2008, and again June 22–28, 2008. The workshop features extensive readings on the southern civil rights movement in the 1960s. Guest speakers, Hamer Institute faculty and oral history panelists will guide participants in exploring the people, places, and events that helped bring about civil rights reform. The workshop also includes field trips to landmarks in Jackson; the Mississippi Delta communities of Greenwood, Ruleville and Clarksdale; and historical sites and the National Civil Rights Museum in Memphis, Tennessee. ## New Program Helps Museums Develop Emergency Plans

Small and mid-sized museums in Mississippi, Ohio and Texas may apply to participate in Heritage Preservation's new pilot project, the Risk Evaluation and Planning Program (REPP). The program provides each participating museum with a professional evaluation of risks to its collections, priorities for mitigating those risks and assistance in creating or updating an emergency plan. Five institutions from each state will be selected in May 2008. ## Host Sites Sought for Katrina Photo Exhibit

Vicksburg photographer Melody Golding has earned national attention and praise for her poignant photography exhibit *KATRINA: MISSISSIPPI WOMEN REMEMBER*. Through a rich collage of images and stories by Mississippi women, the exhibition documents Hurricane Katrina's initial overwhelming devastation, followed by the determination of Mississippi's inhabitants to endure and prevail. Golding went to the Gulf Coast as a volunteer for the American Red Cross, taking supplies and a desire to help. Her unique sepia-toned photographs, as well as a video diary of her year-long sojourn along the coast are stunning and powerful in their simplicity. Her eyewitness account of Katrina's wake, and its impact upon coastal residents from Pearlinton to Pascagoula, is accompanied by

stories written by survivors of the storm. The participants in the photographs and stories are women from Mississippi, many are artists themselves. ## **New NEH Initiative Supports Art in Schools, Libraries, Communities**

The National Endowment for the Humanities has launched a new initiative, *Picturing America*, to bring iconic American art into public and private schools, libraries and communities. *Picturing America* uses art as a catalyst for the study of American history – the cultural, political and historical threads woven into our nation’s fabric over time. It starts with 40 carefully selected masterpieces spanning several centuries. The featured artists range from early American Indian artisans to painters like Mary Cassatt and Thomas Hart Benton; from photographers, including Walker Evans and Dorothea Lange, to architects such as Frank Lloyd Wright. In partnership with the American Library Association, the NEH is distributing large, high-quality reproductions of these works to schools and libraries nationwide, along with materials and lesson plans for use by teachers. ## **The Promises and Problems of Public Scholarship**

Despite the exciting work of organizations like Imagining America and a recent report by the Modern Language Association task force on tenure, many scholars and institutions remain uncertain about how to recognize, value and evaluate project-based, public-oriented research and collaboration in the cultural disciplines. The MLA invites proposals by practitioners of public scholarship across those disciplines for a panel that reflects upon these recent discussions of theories, practices and means of evaluating that scholarship. To explore the promise of public scholarship, proposals are requested from scholars with experience in work that engages with various publics in the research and discoveries crucial to the humanities and the cultural disciplines. ## **Gulfport Arts Program Honored at White House**

The Lynn Meadows Discovery Center for Children in Gulfport was recently awarded the prestigious 2007 Coming Up Taller Award, presented by First Lady Barbara Bush in a ceremony at the White House in Washington, D.C. The Center’s WINGS performing arts program, created to help Gulf Coast elementary, middle and high school students develop important life skills, is one of 18 youth arts and humanities awards to received the award in 2007. More than 350 nominations were submitted for the awards. The Mississippi Humanities Council nominated the Lynn Meadows Discovery Center for Children for the award based on several highly successful humanities programs led by the Center with funding from the Council.

(OXFORD, MS) Writers interested in travel narrative and memoir can hear first–hand from the most influential editors in the field about what they’re looking for and how they choose the work they publish at a three–day conference Feb. 29–March 2, 2008, at the University of Mississippi. Featured speakers will include internationally recognized magazine expert Samir "Mr. Magazine" Husni, journalism department chair at the University of Mississippi and Lee Gutkind, the award–winning editor and founder of *Creative Nonfiction*. Other speakers are prominent writers, editors and agents from across the publishing landscape.
