- LED BY THE MISSISSIPPI HUMANITIES COUNCIL, THE STATE PARTNER OF THE NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE HUMANITIES
- BUILDS ON THE EXPANSION OF THE MISSISSIPPI FREEDOM TRAIL BEYOND TRADITIONAL HISTORICAL MARKERS
- CENTERS LOCAL PEOPLE, PLACES, AND STORIES OFTEN MISSING FROM NATIONAL CIVIL RIGHTS NARRATIVES

- PARTNERS WORK DIRECTLY WITH COMMUNITIES TO IDENTIFY AND INTERPRET SITES OF MEMORY
- SUPPORTS THE CREATION OF PUBLIC COMMEMORATIVE SITES (PHYSICAL AND/OR VIRTUAL)
- WORKS WITH FOUR COMMUNITIES PER YEAR OVER THE COURSE OF THREE YEARS TO ENCOURAGE A MORE HONEST, INCLUSIVE SHARED HISTORY


MISSION and PURPOSE


